## Bebras

This week Computing students in Years 7-10 have been preparing to take part in the Bebras Computational Thinking Challenge. This is a national competition so our students will be competing with students from all over the country. Year 7 will sit the Juniors Challenge, Year 8 and 9 will sit the Intermediate Challenge, and Year 10 the Seniors Challenge.

Computational thinking is an approach to problem solving and there are four strands. Decomposition, which means breaking down a bigger problem into smaller steps. Abstraction, which means removing unnecessary information to focus on the important. Pattern recognition, which involves looking for patterns, sequences or trends in information. Algorithmic thinking, which just means following instructions.




Welcome to the Wellbeing In Mind Team (WIMT).

We have recently started working in Lady Lumley's – pupils might have seen us already in school and hopefully watched our introduction presentation.

The Wellbeing In Mind Team is Lady Lumley's Mental Health Support Team (MHST) and made up of multidisciplinary practitioners coming from a variety of backgrounds which allows us to make sure you are getting the best level of support at the right time.

We are employed by the NHS, working in schools and colleges across York and North Yorkshire to support young people's mental health and wellbeing – working directly with students as well as staff and parents. Part of our role includes delivering Whole School Approach (WSA), coming into school to host workshops, take assemblies and be part of Life curriculum lessons.

We aim to visit every half term with a themed stall to speak to pupils, with the hope of increasing discussion and reducing stigma around mental health and wellbeing.

Our aim is to improve knowledge of how to maintain good mental and know when to ask for more help when needed to ensure safety and wellbeing.

We do work individually and in groups, using Cognitive Behaviour Therapy treatment for pupils who have a mental need and can support with mild to moderate difficulties including: low mood, anxiety, worry, low self-esteem, fears, phobias, panic, and OCD.

The service is low-intensity and considered a preventative, early intervention.

If you or your child feel they would benefit from targeted support, please speak to their Head of Year or the pastoral team to arrange an advice session with us.

We are looking forward to getting to know you more and you becoming more familiar with us.

## Whole School Approach

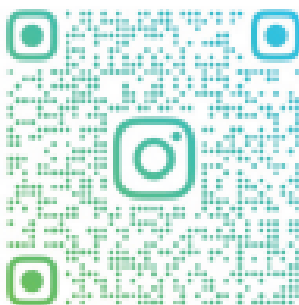
We work collaboratively with all school staff to develop their whole school approach to mental wellbeing. There is no 'one size fits all' and WiMT will be responsive to your school's needs.

## Attendance

Thank you to families for continuing to support and encourage students' attendance over the last half term. It makes a massive difference, and can have a significant impact on grades.

Children missing a week of school are 2.2 times less likely to achieve 5 or more good GCSEs or equivalent at grades including in English and mathematics.

As a school, we expect students to attend regularly (95% as a minimum). Attending school regularly will help set students up with good routines for later in life and the working world, as well as giving them the opportunity to:

- Make friends and feel included
- Learn new things and develop skills
- Increase confidence and self-esteem
- Improve social skills
- Achieve their potential and fulfil aspirations

As parents and carers, we ask that you:

1. Advise us of any serious medical conditions that we may not be aware of.
2. Support us in trying to keep students in school and accessing their learning. There is a useful guide here that gives advice on whether your child is too ill for school <https://www.nhs.uk/live-well/is-my-child-too-ill-for-school/>
3. Avoid booking term-time holidays. We appreciate the impact of the economic crisis and that holidays are cheaper in term-time however we would ask you to consider the longer-term impact of the holiday. Students may have a lovely time whilst away but, on their return, they are out of routine and have missed significant portions of learning in lessons. This results in them struggling in the lesson and anxiety increasing as they try to catch-up.

Students who frequently present as unwell often have another underlying issue e.g. friendship issues or bullying. Please discuss this with your child and inform their Pastoral Officer if they share any worries with you.

We really appreciate your continued support with this.

North Yorkshire Council is now in the second year of providing many of your local services, from rubbish collection and recycling, public health, social care and education, roads, transport and leisure services as well as support for businesses. The council has brought together the services previously provided by eight councils into one, but there is still a significant task ahead as they continue to transform services now and in the years to come.



The council remains passionate about providing value for money services, and improving outcomes for local people, businesses and communities across North Yorkshire. But, like all councils, and many of you, they are facing major financial challenges. They are also experiencing ongoing increases in demand for services like adult social care and children and young people with special educational needs.

The council spends about £1.3 billion every year delivering local services to people and businesses. These include:

- The collection of around 310,000 tonnes of waste from more than 300,000 properties. 45 per cent is reused, recycled or composted.
- Maintaining over 9,250 kilometres of highways and with direct responsibility for nearly 7000 kilometres of public rights of way, and over 1,645 bridges.
- Managing and maintaining 8,300 council houses
- Processing over 50,000 housing benefit changes every year.
- Providing 15,700 children and young people with special educational needs support
- Providing 26 Leisure venues, including 18 with swimming pools
- And supporting more than 3,300 children and young people via our children and families service

**Our NHS – The next chapter: launch of we need to talk public engagement in Humber and North Yorkshire**

The local NHS across Humber and North Yorkshire is embarking on We Need to Talk – a four-week conversation with people through social media and in-person focus groups about the future of the NHS in our area.

Starting on the 14<sup>th</sup> of October and concluding on the 11<sup>th</sup> of November, it will lay bare some of the difficulties faced by the NHS, whilst giving people an opportunity to signal how they might want the NHS to change to meet the challenges of today and the demands of the future.

In a snap poll carried out by NHS Humber and North Yorkshire Integrated Care Board (ICB) ahead of the public engagement, almost 63 per cent of the 428 people who responded said the NHS needed to change.
