INTRODUCTION

Dear Parents and Carers,

It has been such a thrilling week, we watched our F1 team via the YouTube live feed and were proud to be the world leaders in two categories. Well done to everyone involved, our especial thanks go to Mr Shepherd for his experience, wisdom, and dedication, without this we know the teams would not be where they are, thank you.

Year 11 have now completed over half of their mocks, they are definitely tired! Results so far are promising, but we can really see a difference between students who work hard at home, use revision resources and online resources and those who don't. Working at home will have at least a grade difference in outcomes; we can lead a horse to water but can't make them drink....please will parents encourage their child to work at home (if they aren't), it really does make a huge difference.

Year 11 results will be issued in the week beginning 12th January, these will be issued in a formal results assembly, I'll remind parents again nearer the time, but do keep an eye out for the brown envelope.

Holidays in term time. We will refer every term time holiday to the Local Authority for fining. There is a direct link between attendance and acheivement. Teachers are not expected to provide or set work for any child on holiday, nor offer opportunity to catch up lessons or work missed. This is completely the responsibility of the parent and child. The Department for Education provides a very small set of criteria where I am at liberty to approve absence.

We have lost 83.5 days to holiday this term in total. This is significant. Can I stress that we have three **working weeks left this term**. Staff will not be running "activities or fun" lessons and therefore absence over this time is just as significant as any other part of the year.

Behaviour. Our behaviour system automatically creates detentions from cumulative stage 1, 2 and 3. Students undertake detentions at lunchtime, either 10 or 20 minutes. I have been reviewing this process. I want to be able to clear the backlog of time owed by some students so they can end the year positively and start the new year positively. As such those with large blocks of time owing will be placed in isolation during the wb 9th December for the time owed.

E.g. If 6 x 10 minutes of detention are owed, the child will make this time up by a 20 minute lunch detention followed by a period in isolation, therefore clearing their time owed and enabling a clean slate to work from (Note time owing will be rounded up to the nearest whole period). Students will be expected to work independently whilst in isolation so work is not missed. Students will be notified when they will be scheduled for this over the course of that week and parents also informed.

Finally, congratulations to our Further Mathematics A Level students who have been successful in reaching the finals of the National Ritangle Challenge, fingers crossed they can solve the very last problem, well done.

HEALTH RELATIONSHIP WORKSHOP

Thanks to funding from the North Yorks PCC, the NSPCC has formed a partnership with North Yorkshire Council, Police and others to launch a campaign tackling toxic relationships.

As part of this work, they are offering a play and workshop, called It's Not Love to our Year 9 and 10 students in January 2025,

The play has been written by York St John University, toured at schools across the UK and explores a number of themes around relationships. Each play and workshop lasts in total about two hours, the play followed by a big group discussion then an hour long drama workshop.

The workshops use drama to allow the young people to explore the impact of the decisions that the characters make and investigate potential allies and intervention moments. It educates and empowers, enhancing critical life skills like empathy, critical thinking, and problem-solving for future challenges.

We are looking forward to our students taking part in this experience.
