Bebras

In the weeks immediately after half term KS3 Computing students along with Year 10 Computer Science students practiced for and sat the annual Bebras Challenge. This is a national competition that tests students' computational thinking skills. The four strands of computational thinking are how computer programmers start to code these are; abstraction, (removing unnecessary information), decomposition, (breaking down a bigger problem into smaller steps), pattern recognition, and algorithmic thinking. Students who did well in this challenge will have the opportunity to sit a coding challenge in the spring of next year. More to follow about that in February.

We recently received the results of the challenge and certificates will start making their way home over the next week.

We are so proud that 12 of our students received a gold award, this means they are in the top 10% of students in the whole country. Students will be presented with their gold certificates in the celebration assemblies at the end of term. Huge congratulations to Sebastian W, Liam O, Seb W, Stephen E, and George S from Year 7, William P from Year 8, Noah O, Oliwier M, Joshua L, Cayden H, from Year 9 and Ruben P from Year 10.

Students in the top 20% of their year group will receive a certificate of distinction, and students in the top 40% will receive a certificate of merit. There are best in school awards for each level too. Year 7 sat the juniors challenge and Sebastian W (Year 7) achieved best in school for the Junior's category without dropping a single mark. Josh L (Year 9) achieved best in school in the Inter's category (Year 8 and 9) only getting one question incorrect. Ruben P achieved best in school in the Senior's category (Year 10) with a very impressive score of 155. Massive well done to all three of these students.

Our reports will now follow the Delta Academies Trust system which enables Lady Lumley's to compare our students performance with over 30 other schools and will be sent out via the Bromcom app MyChildAtSchool.

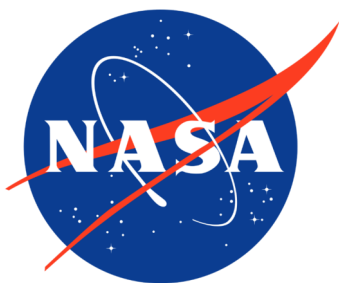
Key Stage 3 students' reports will include data on attendance and punctuality to school, a brief description of the content covered in each subject and the percentage achieved in the assessment alongside an effort grade.

Key Stage 4 students' reports will include data on attendance and punctuality to school, a target grade, a predicted grade and an effort grade for each of their examination subjects.

Year 13 will be taking Pre-Public examinations after Christmas, for some students there will also be BTEC external examinations in the first two weeks of term.

The UK Space Design Competition

On the 23rd November LLS and Scalby sent a team to the UK space design competition at the University of York. The Coast and Vale team and their coworkers have now qualified for the national finals in London in March, with a chance to book their place in the international final at NASA HQ.

Life Updates

This term in Life, students have explored a range of topics aimed at building on work done lower down in school, or setting the groundwork for further exploration higher up in school.

Year 7 have explored friendships and bullying alongside body image before exploring what living in a diverse community means to them.

Year 8 have looked at mental health and well-being and had the opportunity to explore skills around careers and how these relate to the world of work. Students also visited the Scarborough Science and Engineering Week careers fair back in October.

Year 9 have been revisiting healthy coping strategies linked with mental health as well as understanding why some people develop unhealthy coping strategies, and are now looking at issues linked with coercive behaviour, particularly linked to County Lines. The Invisible Man presented YOLO to Year 9, looking at risk-taking behaviour which was well-received by students.

Year 10 have revisited skills they've developed in KS3 to remind themselves how to approach Year 10, whilst looking at budgeting, understanding a payslip and some financial risks, including the use of credit and loan sharks.

Year 11 have looked at how to make the best impression when applying for post-16 providers and jobs as well as reminding themselves why maintaining well-being is important. Careers Appointments continue weekly with Mrs Lowe - if your child has yet to have theirs, it is scheduled in for after Christmas.

December news from the library

We are fast approaching the winter solstice and I look forward to the shortest day as it marks the point when the days begin to lengthen again. Year 7 and 8 students have been engaged in discussions about their book buzz choices and I have encouraged them to try and finish their books during the holidays. I will be hosting a lunch time gathering at the end of the school year for students who have read 10 of the 16 titles from the collection, during which we can talk about the books over lunch and vote for our favourites.



I know that young people have many things that draw them away from finding pleasure in books and as an avid reader myself, I can't help but feel sad that they are missing such a huge range of imagined experiences through which they can learn about the wider world and the lives of others. I'm sharing this passage from the National Literacy Trust that underpins my mission in the library.

Why is reading for pleasure important?

When children and young people enjoy reading, they read more often, helping to build vital reading skills and bringing wider benefits for wellbeing, confidence and learning. Research shows that twice as many children and young people who enjoy reading in their free time have above average reading skills than children who don't enjoy it (34.2% vs 15.7%). In England, respondents with higher literacy skills were found to be significantly more likely to report higher levels of life satisfaction, very good or excellent health, higher levels of trust and increased participation in volunteer activities.

This is reserved for our Zero Heroes, students with 100% attendance and no negative points. We will continue to have reward afternoons at the end of each term, with plans for a grand summer celebration. During the last week of term Mrs Thompson will also be drawing names to spin the wheel during the Key Stage 3 assemblies. Attendance

Thank you for everyone's continued support in encouraging students' attendance. Over half of all our students are achieving the 95% and above attendance target that we aim for, which is brilliant, and we look forward to working on supporting families and students to continue achieving this into the Spring Term.

As well as the on-going rewards system in place for good attendance and behaviour, all students who attend every day of the final week, achieving 100% attendance for the week, will be entered into a prize draw. Teaching and learning will continue in lessons to the very end of the week, and students are expected to attend as usual, for the entire week.

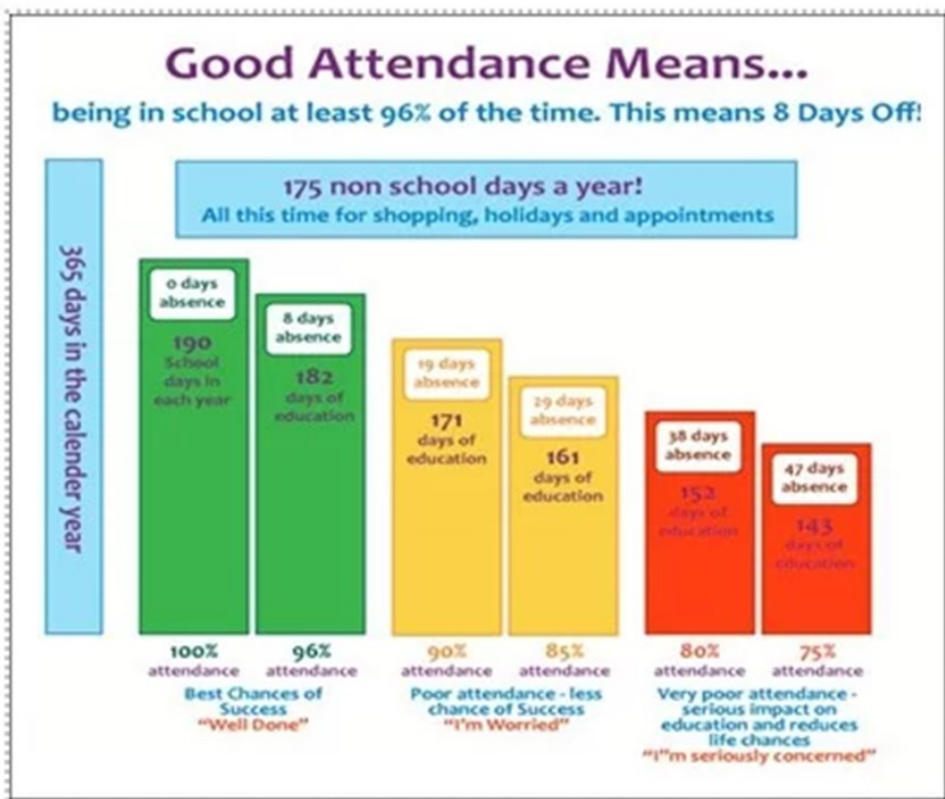
We have noticed a significant increase in students who are reporting that they are unwell and asking to go home. Often, they may have a cold, feel a bit queasy or have a headache and parents/carers are aware and they have then made the decision to send them into school. We appreciate that calling home to collect can impact on your working lives and many of you have to travel to collect. We will continue to talk to students and ensure that they have had a drink, some food that morning, had fresh air and taken some paracetamol if appropriate (students are allowed to carry 2 paracetamol tablets only in school). We will then return them to lessons unless a first aider thinks they need further treatment or to go home. If a student has a medical condition, we will continue to follow the procedures already agreed in school.

As parents and carers, we are asking you to support the school in the following ways:

1. To advise us of any serious medical conditions that we are not aware of
2. To support us in trying to keep students in school and accessing their learning. There is a useful guide here that gives advice on whether your child is too ill for school—[Is my child too ill for school? - NHS](#)
3. Students who frequently present as unwell often have another underlying issue e.g. friendship issues or bullying. If your child is sent home unwell, please discuss this with your child and inform their Pastoral Officer if they share any worries with you.

Regular school attendance is vital to ensure that your child has the best chance for success, as students who are persistently absent achieve lower grades than their peers who attend regularly. Not only this, but regular school attendance allows students to develop life skills, build confidence, and build friendships with their peers.
